A HEALTH LAW CERTIFICATE recognizes J.D. students who have completed the required health law coursework and co-curricular activities listed in this document. A student must complete the following requirements:

I. EIGHTEEN CREDIT HOURS OF DESIGNATED HEALTH LAW COURSES

Student must take and obtain a grade average of 2.75 or better in a minimum of eighteen credit hours in designated health law courses. There are 12 hours of required courses, and six hours of electives. Course names may vary. Confirm any differences with the Program Director.

II. SUBSTANTIAL PAPER

Students must submit a health law paper to be reviewed and approved by the Health Law Program Director. Papers completed for a health law course (taken for the substantial paper component), directed research (independent study under the supervision of a faculty member), or journal note/comment will fulfill this requirement.
